Intermediate level quilting skills required: Rotary cutting, accurate 1/4" piecing, paper foundation piecing



Spiral Lone Star by Jan Krentz approximately 46" x 46"

The Spiral Lone Star design is *guaranteed* to spark excitement! Visually dynamic, this graphic show-stopper is constructed with many traditional quilting methods. The central star is strip pieced, and the setting squares and corners are paper-pieced on a foundation paper. The secondary diamond units are pieced with special contrasting seam inserts to add sparkle.

The Spiral Lone Star pattern is written as a wall-hanging sized quilt. There are many different options to customize your design by changing the setting squares, secondary diamonds or outer corners. The class will follow the basic Spiral pattern as written in the fully updated Spiral Lone Star pattern pack. Options for personalizing your quilt will be shared during the class.

★ Note: If you want to create a bed-sized design, please contact Jan prior to class by email (below) for more information.

Two areas of the Spiral design are constructed with **paper foundation piecing**. Students who plan to make the *wall-hanging sized quilt* may print or trace the patterns before the workshop (from the pattern pack). Students who plan to *enlarge the quilt* or *design their own setting squares and corners* during class may trace or duplicate those foundations from their original patterns in class.

Numerous **foundation paper** choices are available today: freezer paper (from the roll), pre-cut 8.5" x 11" freezer paper sheets, newsprint, vellum, and others. If you have a favorite product and plan to use the foundation patterns in your Spiral quilt, please bring your favorite paper. I will bring a range of papers for testing in class.

Jan will bring an assortment of long rulers, 3" x 18" and quilter's square rulers, freezer paper, pencil sharpener, double stick tape, Add-a-Quarter tools, Corner Marking Seam Allowance tools, Strip Sticks for use in class. A printer will be available for a small number of prints in class, or large quantities of enlargements or prints can be made locally in commercial print shops as needed.

Additional fabric and other sewing supplies are available for purchase from the Cotton Patch on-site quilt store.

Fabric Requirements:

The Spiral Lone Star features at least 9 different fabrics. Eight fabrics appear in the center diamond units, setting squares, secondary diamonds and corners. The 9th fabric appears in the background of the corner squares, an optional outer border (not pictured in the quilt on page 1) and binding. Batting plus a backing fabric of your choice is selected following the quilt top construction (and not required for class).

The following list is for the original size 46"x46" square wall-hanging size.

Helpful hints with fabric selection -3/4 yard each of eight fabrics, shaded from light to dark. You need sufficient contrast between the fabrics to see the spiral effect easily.

Yardage amounts have been rounded up to permit you to use fabrics artistically in various areas such as the setting square compass points, secondary diamond embellishments, and corner compass points, or replace a piece or two that may have been accidentally mis-cut.

For optional narrow accent trim of cotton or specialty fabrics (seen on the secondary diamonds) and scattered through the compass points: add a small collection of unusual fabrics for shimmer and sparkle. Jan will have a selection of tissue lame pieces for optional purchase in class.

Specialty fabrics: tissue lamé, silk, chiffon, light weight brocade, sheer ribbons, or exotic trim pieces. Each of these materials has its own personality, requiring patience and care when constructing the quilt.

NOTE-specialty fabrics are often challenging to work with, requiring patience and a cool iron. You may use cotton fabrics for this embellishment.

You might also consider piecing the specialty fabrics into the compass points for the setting squares or outer corners. In this application, I recommend that a sheer interfacing be pressed to the wrong side of the specialty fabric to make it stronger and more stable for use in pieced designs.

- The sheer interfacing is sold in the fabric store, either by the yard or in pre-cut packages, and recommended for lightweight fabrics.
- This interfacing is NOT listed on the fabric list.

Fabric Chart – paste your fabrics in this chart for use in class. If you are working from your personal fabric stash, you may use several similar fabrics in the same position (for example: 1-3 different light-light prints, 1-3 medium value prints, etc.) The compass points and strips can be cut from several different fabrics if they visually "read" the same color and value.
